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On 27 April 2013, the CPME Board adopted the 'CPME Statement of Solidarity on the Situation of Healthcare in Cyprus' (CPME 2013/070 FINAL)

## **CPME Statement of Solidarity on the Situation of Healthcare in Cyprus**

The Standing Committee of European Doctors (CPME) represents national medical associations across Europe. We are committed to contributing the medical profession's point of view to EU and European policy-making through pro-active cooperation on a wide range of health and healthcare related issues.

- We believe the best possible quality of health and access to healthcare should be a reality for everyone. To achieve this, CPME promotes the highest level of medical training and practice, the safe mobility of physicians and patients, lawful and supportive working conditions for physicians and the provision of evidence-based, ethical and equitable healthcare services. We offer support to those working towards these objectives whenever needed.
- We see the patient-doctor relationship as fundamental in achieving these objectives and are committed to ensuring its trust and confidentiality are protected while the relationship evolves with healthcare systems. Patient safety and quality of care are central to our policies.
- We strongly advocate a 'health in all policies' approach to encourage cross-sectoral awareness for and action on the determinants of health, to prevent disease and promote good health across society.

CPME's policies are shaped through the expertise provided by our membership of national medical associations, representing physicians across all medical specialties all over Europe and creating a dialogue between the national and European dimensions of health and healthcare.

The Board of the Standing Committee of European Doctors (CPME), representing national medical associations across Europe, was deeply concerned to learn from the Cyprus Medical Association of policy developments which threaten to impair the quality of healthcare in Cyprus and imposes harsh measures on a large number of doctors practicing in Cyprus.

In full awareness of the economic and societal challenges posed by the economic restraints which Cyprus currently faces, we appeal to the Cypriot government:

- To ensure that all measures that are currently taken are compatible with the national policy of implementing the Cypriot National healthcare system by 2015 and do not infringe upon the rights of healthcare professionals.
- To ensure that the Cyprus Medical Association should be fully involved in the creation and implementation of the states healthcare policies.



- To acknowledge that the establishment and operation of healthcare entities cannot be equated to that of purely commercial bodies and must therefore be regulated in full respect of professional regulations in order to protect patient safety and quality of care.
- To safeguard the best possible quality and availability of healthcare services by ensuring lawful and sustainable working conditions for healthcare professionals, including appropriate remuneration, as agreed with the representative organisations of the profession.
